A Message from Falmouth's Minor Injuries Unit

We are asking residents and visitors who require urgent, but not emergency care, to contact us by calling NHS 111 by phone or www.111.nhs.uk before attending our minor injury unit (MIU) or other urgent care provider. The main reason for doing this is to keep people safe during the pandemic and avoid overcrowding in our waiting rooms.

People turning up at our minor injury unit without a referral from NHS 111 may be sent elsewhere or, they may have to wait longer than those referred, unless they need immediate treatment.

Getting you to the right place for your needs will give you a better experience and help to keep you safe. If you do need an NHS service, we will make that as close to home and as fast as we can.
